Of House and Home


I will view the 2007 raffle quilt in a different light from now on because I know the difference between a house and a home.

Though I probably won’t get my quilt finished for the show before I leave for Africa, I found what’s important. No matter where I go, I know where home is. I’m sure I’ll see you there!

Nan thanked all those whose prayers and good wishes went out to her and her family. Her son was involved in a car accident and was hurt but the accident could have taken his life and so we are all so grateful that this did not occur.

Minutes of Executive Board Meeting July 19, 2007

A motion was made by Velma that the pins be used in a drawing of those who had worked the Quilt show during the August meeting. Jane seconded the motion and it was passed with one opposed.

There will be beverages prepared for the August meeting but because it has not been possible to fill the hostess positions needed no snacks will be furnished.

The pieced blocks given out this month are a bit short of fabric.

Cheryl has fabric available for anyone needing it.

There was no old business. A decision was made that envelopes would be available for those working the Quilt Show to order lunch. Twy will be working at the Fair on August 30th and needs volunteers to be present to work on projects. These may be your personal project or ones that she has available.

The meeting was closed by Jean at 10:55a.m.

We'll cut and sew most of the units for four 16-unit blocks in class - the rest is up to you! Jean will bring templates and diagrams not only of the Drunkard's Path block but also many basic variations (basic variations are sixteen-unit blocks with eight units of light background/dark quarter-circles and eight units of dark background/light quarter-circles). You'll be surprised to see how many variations are possible just by how the units are arranged. The three-template system taught in this class and the easy tips and techniques you'll learn will definitely lead you down the path to lots of fun and lots of possibilities!

We take our job of taking care of your quilts seriously. Please be patient while the hanging/unhanging crew does it's job and delivers the quilts to the depot tables. Please remember to bring your receipt or send it with the person assigned to pick up your quilts. If you will not be able to be at the show on Sunday and would like the depot person to hold your quilt for you at her house, please call her in advance to make arrangements.

Each quilt must be checked off the depot list as it is picked up so there is no confusion. We all want each and every quilt to go home with the right person.

Small Quilt Auction

The quilt show will have its first small quilt silent auction with these donated quilts. Each person who donated a quilt was eligible to nominate a charitable group for each quilt donated. The Children's Advocacy Center was chosen in a drawing to receive the proceeds of the auction. The center has been the recipient of community quilts from the guild.

The Lincoln County Children's Advocacy Center is a day-use child abuse assessment and intervention facility for children who have been victims of abuse. The center was built to provide a neutral, safe and child-friendly place to begin the healing of abuse, and was designed more like a home than an office, with the setting and décor especially chosen to create a calm and caring atmosphere for abuse victims under the age of 18 and their families.

The center was built on property donated by the City of Newport, and construction was funded through a community development block grant. Community businesses, organizations and individuals contributed generously toward the shared vision of a Children's Advocacy Center in Lincoln County, and the center opened in February 1997

Videotaped forensic interviews are conducted in age-appropriate interview rooms and specially trained doctors perform medical assessments. Mental health

services and victim advocacy are just some of the services provided at the center, all in one location, for victims of abuse. The center's prevention program provides home visiting mentor services and many other off-site child abuse prevention services. A warm and friendly atmosphere, caring staff, volunteers, snacks and stuffed animals all help to make the child feel comfortable and supported throughout his/her exposure to a system that can often re-traumatize child victims of abuse. The center has served 1,520 children between 1997 when it opened through 2006.


We are hoping to have a very successful auction this year for a substantial donation and to make the auction a regular feature at our quilt shows.



July Nifty Notion Binding Miter Tool

Lynda Shephard, introduced her Baby Bear Paw class to the Binding Miter Tool made by Animas. It makes it possible to create perfect mitered corners on your quilt bindings. It does 90° for squares and rectangles, 120° for hexagons and 135° for octagons and tablerunners. With this tool, the binding joins at the corners instead of in the middle of a side. For small quilts, the only joining in the binding is at the corners. 



Pat Dunlop is the mom of an army soldier. While living in Sisters in 2004, she and others made 150 heart shaped pillows to send to the Central Oregon National Guard stationed in the Middle East. It took them 2½ days. They sent the hearts in gallon Ziploc bags.

Pat moved to Depoe Bay and now owns the Ocean Waves store there. Her involvement in the group continued after her move. The group has added neck coolies to help lower body temperatures. To date they have sent over 4500 pillows and over 2500 neck coolies. Not to mention candy, puzzles, reading material, lotion, pens, and seasonal items. Actually anything they can lay their hands on.

Pat says that the big push now is for the neck coolies because of the extreme heat. The soldiers like getting the handmade pillows because it lets them know they are remembered, but the coolies are especially appreciated. Pat has patterns and crystals for filling available in her store. She asks that you only take the supplies if you are going to return a finished item. Any other things such as candy or personal items that you would like to donate, Pat will include in her next box.

Funding for this organization comes from her store along with donations of goods and labor from people like you. They are now a 501(c)(3), tax exempt, non-profit group and are continuing to grow.

Pat always asks service personnel what they need. The usual answer is "We appreciate *anything* from home."
