King Cotton

Cotton is the world's major nonfood crop, providing half of all textiles. Some 80 countries produce cotton. In the U.S. the business generates billions annually.

Most of the cotton spun and woven in U.S. mills is used for clothing but also used for bookbinding, fishnets, handbags, coffee filters, lace, tents, curtains and diapers.

Cotton rag becomes stationary and paper for currency. Crystallized cottonseed oil became America's first vegetable shortening, Crisco.

The short fibers, or linters, left on the cottonseed after ginning are combined with chemicals and converted into linoleum, photographic film, dynamite, fingernail polish, and molded plastics.

New Advertiser in our Newsletter-Rod & Wheel Wool & Reel

Jim and Grace Mick describe their new business venture as "a man cave and a she shed that we sell stuff out of." Grace is a Latimer member who knits and likes to spin. She has several spinning wheels at home as well as at the shop. She finds spinning very meditative and relaxing. She has Jacob, Shetland, Border Leicester, Finn and down type fleeces which she processes by hand, to market as washed wool, combed locks, roving and handspun yarn. She will also be processing alpaca, camel, mohair, and pygora fiber. She focuses on local vendors as much as possible. She gets Merino and Merino blends from Fiber with a Twist, a small mill near St. Helens. She will also stock Romeldale fleeces and carded batts from Cedar Creek Far & Fiber in Beavercreek. Soon she will have blended cones of yarn from Yarnia in Portland.

On the Rod and Reel side of the business Grace ties fishing flies, particularly the full dress salmon and steelhead flies. Jim builds custom fishing rods. He will also refurbish and repair fishing rods upon his retirement at the end of October. They will stock a select line of fishing gear directed to the local fisheries.

The shop is located in Cloverdale right beside the big flashing Nestucca High School sign on Hwy. 101.

When I was a child I became fascinated by rag rugs as my mother purchased many for our home from local weavers. I set a goal to be a weaver.


After I retired I joined an artist who could weave a rug in a day. I went home that day with a rug AND a good sized floor loom. I joined the Grand Rapids weavers guild and learned how to dress my loom and began weaving rugs. I used the name ReRug meaning rugs made from reused materials.

In 2011 I joined the Portland Handweavers Guild and started selling rugs at their sales. Stephanie Anderson introduced me to Latimer and I now consign rag rugs there. I also consign wool socks knit on a restored antique circular socks knitting machine. For my rugs, I buy cotton tablecloths, sheets, etc. at Goodwill and tear or cut them to size for weaving. I also use Pendleton Woolen Mills selvedges, a waste product from their wool blankets. After 15 or more years I still love weaving rugs. Each rug is unique. To continue the theme, ReRug, I hem the rugs on my mothers 1939 sewing machine. It is a lot of fun.








Hurrah for our Cordelia's Knitters


