Damascus Fiber Arts School Tapestry Exhibit



A Message from our President

I find that the origins and stories of a simple color like red have always interested me with the tales they have to tell.

The rich, deep red used in textiles like quilts was originally referred to as Turkey red. The name came from Turkey red carpets, made in Turkey. The complicated dye was developed between



1650-1700. The beauty of this mordant dye was that it was dye-safe even when alizarin dye was introduced commercially in 1871.

With the good news of red becoming dye-fast, quilters were energized to use red and whites fabrics together. By the turn of the century red and white quilts were the trend. In 1880 red floss, for embroidery, also became dye-fast, ushering in the surge of red embroidery on white that we know as red work. Redwork was perfect for personalizing quilts, so quilters produced signature quilts, fundraising quilts, and conservation quilts.

Quilt patterns like Drunkard's Path, Irish Chain, and Nine Patch began to appear. Quilters started to creatively use a combination of redwork embroidery and patchwork in their quilts.

Enter the Depression era in the early 1900's and the red and white color combination spilled into the mills that produced feed sacks for women to use in clothing and quilts.




Meet Our New Manager–Jennifer Lawrence


